

Welcome to Clapham

At the centre of the village runs Clapham Beck, which starts life high on the slopes adjoining Ingleborough. It plunges to subterranean depths, emerging to run down into the lake, over a waterfall and through the village, passing beneath four bridges.

There are walks to suit all abilities. Leave the large car park for a stroll in the village or climb Ingleborough, one of the Three Peaks, which can be approached from the village by at least three recognised routes.

Follow the Estate Nature Trail and visit Ingleborough Cave. Afterwards carry on through Trow Gill to Gaping Gill where Fell Beck falls 104 metres into a chamber said to be large enough to hold York Minster. On the two main Bank Holidays, local caving clubs, who are very active throughout the year, offer to winch members of the public down, and up!

Based in the village is the Cave Rescue Organisation which serves people and animals above and below ground across a wide area of the Dales.

Clapham is the home of the Farrer family whose Ingleborough estate was established in the 18th Century. The family is responsible amongst many things for the beauty and continued existence of the woods, fields, walls and moors which cradle the village and its farms. Reginald Farrer, a notable botanist, lived here.

Below the waterfall at the head of the village stands the Church of St. James, which was founded in Norman times. The 12th Century tower remains, the rest of the church dates from the 19th Century.

Clapham is a focal point for walks to Austwick, Selside, Horton-in-Ribblesdale, Norber and its sea of boulders, the quiet of Crummackdale. The rest of the Dales and the Lake District are a short drive away. Visit this unspoiled village which provides a glimpse of the life and environment of the Yorkshire Dales.
