

### Clapham Community Shop holds its 3rd AGM

Thirty eight people gathered in the village hall for the shop's third Annual General Meeting. At 6:30pm only one person had turned up—and they told us that people probably would not come as they were very happy with the way the shop is being run! It was therefore with some alarm that there were so many people in the hall at 7:00pm! Added to that, it had been made very clear that we had to be finished by 8:45pm—since everyone was going to get up and leave then in order to be home to watch our local media stars John and Will Dawson on the telly!

Nevertheless, everything went smoothly and it was possible to report on a good year for the shop. Headlines for the end of the year have been that, despite the fact that initial forecasts had indicated that we might not be in profit until the end of our third year of trading, we have made a profit in the year 2016 / 17. Our sales have increased largely due to the extension to the retail area at the back of the shop and our gross profit margin has also increased from 23% to 24.8% with some of our best earners being greetings cards, hot drinks, bacon butties, eggs and bananas. An interesting shopping basket, but as one of our customers remarked 'Where else can you buy HP sauce, napkins and earrings?'

We could not summarise the year without acknowledging the role played by our staff and volunteers in this success. We now have four paid staff, which we regard as an achievement given the contribution this makes to the local economy as well as to the successful running of the shop. They are all an asset to the business in their

own roles. With specific reference to the volunteers, our Treasurer was able to put a financial value on the work they do. If we had to have a second employee to work with the manager or supervisor it would cost another £25000 a year, so that is a financial measure of how much the volunteers put into the shop. Without them it would not be viable. Everyone who works in the shop is to be thanked for the hard work they put into keeping it open and making it such an asset to the village.

One particular group of volunteers who play a key role is the Management Committee who are responsible for the overall running of the business. It was with sadness this year that Don Gamble, who played such a significant part in rescuing the shop and turning it into a successful community venture, has decided to stand down. Don will be much missed for his wisdom and his humour. However every group needs new blood and it is very encouraging to have two new people come forward to join the committee. This now consists of Chrissie Bell, Ian Crossley [new member], Diane Elphinstone, Marilyn Galpin, Jill Gates, Kathy Hall, Sue Mann, Angela Peach, George Sheridan, Liz Walton [new member], Denise Wilson, Helen Rollinson, as Shop Manager, is also in attendance. The meeting ended well before the 'guillotine' of 8:45pm and all were at home and in front of the box in time to enjoy the unfolding of the farming year at Bleak Bank!

### Clapham Community Shop Ltd: Payment by debit or credit card

You may be aware that the Government is going to ban extra charges added to payments for goods and services made by credit or debit card. In the shop, up to now, we have made a charge of 25p on payments of less than £20. We took this decision to help us to cover the cost of the charges paid to the card companies. The shop has exceeded expectations in its first two years of trading, so we are going to remove that charge ahead of the Government deadline. From August 1st we will no longer make any charge for the use of credit or debit cards.

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### Wildlife in Clapham

### Hummingbird Hawkmoth - Macroglossum Stellatarum

This month's featured species is not a bird but a moth with a bird's name. The hummingbird hawkmoth is a fairly large day-time flying moth. It has a dark grey body with orangey brown wings and, as its name suggests, it flies like a hummingbird. When it is feeding, the hummingbird hawkmoth hovers and sticks its long tongue into flowering plants like red valerian and buddleia. This long tongue also looks like the long bill of a hummingbird. In the past, hummingbird hawkmoths have been misidentified as a hummingbird feeding on garden plants.

The hummingbird hawkmoth originates from North Africa and Southern Europe. After they have bred there then they will then start migrating north looking for new areas to breed and, in good summers, large numbers of them will arrive in the UK and Northern Europe. Some even manage to hibernate and survive the British winter to breed the following spring.

This year has been a good year for the hummingbird hawkmoth around the local area with four having been seen so far this year. The first was seen at Ingleborough Hall on 26th May. The next two were seen feeding together on the red valerian at Smithy cottage on 9th June and the fourth one was seen at Ingleborough Hall on 13th July.

All our local birds and summer visitors are now breeding or feeding young. Young blackbirds, song thrushes, blue and great tits, willow warblers, oystercatchers and lapwings have been seen around the local area. A pair of kestrels that bred under the viaduct at River Bank Cottage raised at least one young, also a pair of spotted flycatchers were seen feeding young at River Bank Cottage, with another pair possibly breeding at Arbutus House.

Alan Bennett reported to me that he had a pair of grey wagtails breeding in his back garden, there was also another pair of grey wagtails breeding at Chrissie Bell's house and a third pair was found breeding in the old courtyard at Ingleborough Hall - even though they are associated with becks, streams and rivers they will breed some distance away from water. Two little egrets were seen flying up the River Wenning near Clapham station on 20th May: they were later seen several times feeding by Austwick Beck. Four juvenile stonechats were found on the old railway line near Nutta Farm on 26th May - these will be locally bred birds. One very late fieldfare was seen at Ingleborough Hall on 11th June. This species is normally seen in large flocks during autumn, winter and early spring.

area? Did you know that our vicar has said grace to The Queen? If not, you need to read on to discover more about the lives of Melanie and Ian Greenhalgh who will soon be leaving this parish after thirteen years.

Melanie was born in Manchester in 1958. She enjoyed what she describes as a poor but happy childhood with her

younger brother and sister. Her grandfather was a devoted communist who achieved the distinction of an honorary M.A. from Manchester University. He showed his devotion to the cause by giving his son, Melanie's father, the forenames Karl Marx in honour of his hero. At school Melanie enjoyed creative subjects more than academic ones and she positions liked having responsibility such as being a prefect. Her hobbies were tap and ballet. I know that at some stage in her education she became an excellent cook because her cakes are well worth looking out for at village functions. After school she trained as a nursery nurse but there were no jobs so she became a civil servant at the DHSS in Sale.

Ian was born in Lancaster in 1949, the middle one in a family of

three boys. His father, an engineer, went to Bristol to train as a vicar when Ian was still a young boy but the family stayed in Lancashire where Ian attended school in Fulwood. He liked maths, which perhaps explains how he became school chess champion, but his enthusiasm for academic work did not match his enthusiasm for football and cricket. He was glad to leave and when he did so he worked for Barclay's bank. By this time his father was working as a vicar so Ian and his brother set up a youth club attached to the church, a worthy cause which had unexpected benefits because it was there that he met Melanie. She was fourteen at the time but they did not start going out with each other until four years later. Two years after that they married.

Working with young people in the club made Ian reconsider what he wanted to do in life. His father wanted him to become a bank manager but Ian thought he would be happier working with people rather than money. In 1974 he began three years training for the life of a vicar at Wycliffe Hall, Oxford where he was the only trainee who had not been to public school and the only one without a degree. His Lancashire accent caused some amusement, especially in Greek tutorials, but he survived the course and relished the opportunity to play lots of sport. He was ordained on Melanie's birthday in 1977 by David Shepherd, The Bishop of Liverpool, who is better known to cricket fans as a very fine English test batsman. His first parish was in St Helens where he served for three years and it was during this period that he and Melanie were married. He

> Ian then decided to take on a new challenge when he embarked on a special RAF course for people such as padres, teachers, doctors and dentists. It was a rigorous training but perhaps not as tough and exhausting as it would be for a fighter pilot. His first posting was to Halton in Buckinghamshire where Melanie gave birth to their second child, Tom, in a military hospital.

> During his RAF career, Ian and Melanie were posted here and there more times than a chain letter. There was one occasion when Melanie was nearly arrested. Ian was away so a friend with a pantechnicon offered to

help her with one of the moves - but he could only do so late at night. When they began to load the lorry, someone on the estate was understandably suspicious so he phoned the police who turned up in a squad car ready to apprehend the burglars. She convinced them that she was innocent so it is a good job that Melanie does not look like a criminal.

The Berlin Wall was pulled down during their time in that city but I am not sure if they were responsible for it or merely cheering on the sidelines along with the rest of us. Ian said grace to The Queen and had lunch with her when she visited RAF Marham and, during his time in The Falklands, Mrs Thatcher arrived in a giant Hercules within which she had her private caravan. She attended one of his services and he preached to her; an interesting example of role reversal. He also went to Las Vegas where he was the first British runner in the annual marathon, to Bosnia and to NATO HQ in Europe. It was there that Ian became famous and his story did the rounds in NATO meetings for some time afterwards. There was an important gathering attended by numerous high ranking dignitaries and when the business was completed it was Ian's job to explain the arrangements for refreshments. "Ladies and gentlemen," he announced in his finest padre's voice, "would you like to come into the next room for drinks and nipples?" I was too gentlemanly to ask him what people said in reply.

Ian chose to leave the RAF in 2004 but I have no reason to believe that his decision was connected in any way to the previous incident. (Continued on page 9) They came to live in Austwick where his role is very different from his duties in service life. In the RAF many marriages are under stress as a result of separation but here his pastoral work involves many other matters. They love living here as so many of us do because they like the people, the scenery and the opportunity it gives them to enjoy their various hobbies such as craft work, dancing, running, walking and cycling. I will leave you to work out who does which. They had to decide where they would live in retirement. Ian wanted to live in the Ripon area because he likes worshipping in Ripon cathedral but Melanie pointed out that she has been following Ian around

for 38 years so now is the time for Ian to follow her. Melanie did not want to lose her friends and all contact with this area so their next move, the thirteenth in their marriage, will be to Giggleswick where they hope to have more time to spend together.

Next year they will celebrate Melanie's sixtieth birthday and their fortieth wedding anniversary by visiting Australia, a holiday that she has long dreamed about. I am sure we all wish them happy celebrations and an enjoyable retirement.

### **Clapham Steam Update**

Clapham Station continues to see a reasonable amount of steam traffic, though it is mostly light engine movements to and from Hellifield, where the locos are used for Settle-Carlisle workings, or testing and training runs for Carnforth-based engines that are being prepared for mainline duties. An interesting example of the latter came through on 6th July when the former Southern Railway's Rebuilt Merchant Navy class no 35018 "British India Line" came through on a loaded test run. This engine was withdrawn for scrap in 1964, spent the next 15 years rusting away in south Wales and was eventually purchased for preservation in 1979. The slow process of restoration began in 1980 and it has taken up to the present day to get her ready to re-enter mainline service!

In the last few weeks, the regular "Dalesman" service over the Settle and Carlisle has run most Mondays and Tuesdays though, in the future, it will largely give way to the Tuesday "Fellsman" service from Lancaster. The locos for the "Dalesman" travel past Clapham at the start and end of their working day, though they usually run backwards or, as has happened on one occasion, somewhat incongruously attached facing backwards and at the rear of their train! Former LMS loco 46115 "Scots Guardsman" has had the majority of these workings.

Clapham's first (and possibly only!) real steam working for 2017 is scheduled for Saturday 30<sup>th</sup> September when the Lune Rivers Trust Special is due to pass. It's far too early to know which engine will be given the duty however.

Over on the Settle and Carlisle, a number of trips headed by 60103 "Flying Scotsman" are scheduled to take place on Sundays throughout the summer. Starting in York, these head north through Settle around lunch time and return in the early evening, so there are multiple chances to spot them if you happen to be near the Helwith Bridge at the time!

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### **Clapham Website Relaunched**

The Clapham Development Association (CDA) is the successor of the Clapham Traders Group which was originally formed by the businesses in the village. Richard Sexton was involved, along with Keith Manion who was the landlord of the New Inn at the time, together with others. They produced the original village brochure and A65 signs. The group disbanded in the 90s.

It was about 2002 when the late Dr J A Farrer approached David Kingsley to see if he could muster support to reproduce the old village brochure. David approached various businesses but they were reluctant to finance this project. He realised that funding was the only way, and to do this required the formation of an elected community group with constitution and elected committee; the CDA. The group got support from villagers and some local businesses. They obtained funding from Craven Council and a quality brochure was produced 'without advertising'.

In 2004 the CDA felt that a website was necessary so feelers were put out for assistance. David and Jackie had a guest staying at their guest house – Peter Collings Wells. He offered to create the website for the price of a couple of free weekends. Since then Peter has been updating and maintaining the site.


Now 13 years later, we are relaunching it. The new website has been designed to continue where the old one left off, while making use of the latest technology and security. It is fully 'responsive', which means the design will adapt to make it easy to use on all devices - mobile phones, tablets, and regular desktop computers.

Features include information for visitors and locals, a local business list, events (updated by villagers), parish council page, photos by John Peter Farrer, and the newsletter archive (numbers 1 - 107 coming soon). It has been built for free, using popular off-the-shelf software (WordPress) so it can evolve in content and design if required.

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### **Parish Council News**

The Parish Council met on 27th June 2017

A report of a blocked drain on Church Avenue in Clapham had been received. It was noted however that this had been unblocked prior to the meeting. It was also noted that North Yorkshire County Council Highways Department had responded to correspondence from the Council in relation to the state of the road near to Calterber Bridge and have placed the matter on their list of jobs requiring digging-up of the road.

Efforts to appoint a new Parish Caretaker were still under way and the Council hoped to be in a position to appoint a caretaker at the July meeting.

The Council received an update in relation to hyper-fast broadband project. There had been a successful period of work since the Council's last meeting. The "Clapham loop", together with ducts to properties around the village, had been completed. The project had also attracted the support of a number of volunteers from the village.

Council decided to support Merchant Navy Day on September 3<sup>rd,</sup> 2017 by seeking to fly the Red Ensign from the Church flagpole.

### **Planning**

Application 18/2017/17834-Erection of three dwellings and associated access and landscaping on the site of the former Dalesview Garage, Clapham was considered. The Council was opposed to this application which proposes building on land which had, at an earlier stage, been designated as community space.

The Council authorised letters of support to two farmers in the Keasden area for their proposed development of woodland and hedgerows.

### **Yorkshire Dales Millennium Trust**

In the 20 years since the Yorkshire Dales Millennium Trust (YDMT) has been operating, we've raised more than £28m from a diverse range of funding sources to benefit the environmental, social and economic well-being of this special area.

Over the last couple of years, with major new schemes being launched, YDMT has taken on several new members of staff and we are now a significant employer in the area. Of the 25 employees, most live within about 10 miles of Clapham, and three live within the parish.

Numerous projects have taken place in Clapham and nearby areas; recent projects include dry stone wall restoration, a new shelter for the playpark, educational trips to farms and archaeological sites for Clapham schoolchildren, and restoration of the Victorian drinking fountain (work is to start soon). We also support the shop by renting office space there, as well as buying lots of its goodies!

Last year we ran very popular short courses looking at the traditional buildings in Clapham. We are repeating the courses in Ingleton (19th August 2017) and Chapel-le-Dale (20th September 2017). ### **News from the Farm**

It was the vicar's fault.

Sometime in July of last year, while I was having a perfectly innocent cup of coffee and possibly a chocolate biscuit, I answered the phone to a nice young lady who introduced herself as Emily Cadman from a television company, based in Leeds, called True North. I reached for another biscuit.

It turned out that True North had been commissioned to make a series of eight one-hour programmes about people who live and work in the national park. This was because both the Yorkshire Dales national park and the Lake District national park have recently been expanded and this series would be designed to celebrate life and community within both parks.

Emily wondered what I thought. "First name terms already" is what I thought, but I said celebrating life and work in the dales was a brilliant idea. But what did it have to do with Bleak Bank?

Apparently one of the things True North do when they begin to investigate working in an area that is new to them is to ask the local vicar who and what he knows — who knew? This had now turned into a three biscuit coffee break of the type that are normally reserved for visits from the bank manager or the farm assurance inspector!

Emily telly (she had a new name) visited Bleak Bank a few days later to discuss her thoughts and to see if we could help each other. Turns out she thought we could. We had another long coffee time with the added extra of ginger

biscuits. The basic idea was for True North to visit the farm once or twice a month, to film whatever we were busy with, for a period of about six months or until they decided it was a waste of their time and effort. Hopefully they would gather enough information about life, work and our standard farming disasters to help introduce the general public to what happens on a small upland family farm. Apparently not everybody knows that life in the parish of Clapham is where it all happens and they needed educating.

Next we met Tash who soon became Tash telly (I sense a pattern). She came to spend a whole day with us to see if there was anything to work with and quite remarkably she found something. She also took the ginger biscuit recipe.

On the second visit she brought Ben the camera manwho was Ben telly before he got out of the car. He came armed with some very high tech equipment, from lighting to cameras to sound recording but crucially no wellies, anyway we sorted him out.

It soon became apparent that both Tash and Ben were very patient and understanding when it came to working with amateurs. They were happy to film the same sequence several times from various angles until they were reasonably satisfied. We probably filmed for about seven days to make the bit that actually makes up our tiny, tiny part of "The Yorkshire Dales and the Lakes" TV series.

In one of the episodes the film crew join us for an Ingleborough gather, and in order for Emily to have an idea of how it all worked, I took her on a walk up the mountain the day before. We got to the first steep bit and Emily promptly fainted. Anyway, in true showbiz tradition, she got back up and the show stumbled on.

Much of our day-to-day farming now involves the quad bike, and both dogs and staff are comfortable using it. Not so telly people - it frightens the pants off them. "An insurance nightmare" was a favourite phrase.

All of us at Bleak Bank hope that the glimpse into life and occasional work on our farm has contributed something to a series of programmes that people find informative and enjoyable. To quote Jane Austen - "for what do we exist but to provide sport for our neighbours"!
